Ottawa Flyer Tells of Attack On Rommel's Afrika Korps

Hearing Flt. Sgt. Walter Edward Douglas talk about sweeps over the sandy wastes of Libya, it's a business which is almost as com-

monplace as shovelling the sidewalk.

Leaving Africa for England in mid-December, Flt. Sgt. Douglas found himself at an Eastern Canadian port because his ship wanted to disembark some U. S. Army Air Force personnel. He managed to get leave to make an unexpected visit home before continuing to Britain, He is visiting his family at 362 Waverly street for a few days.

Saw Fall of Tobruk.

Twenty-five years old, and the northern coastline for hundreds son of Garnet Douglas, "Eddie", oh miles." as he is commonly known to his friends in Ottawa, has been in Africa since February, 1942. He was in Malta for a short time, saw the fall of Tobruk, and was in the thick of the aerial fighting when the British attacked Rommel last Fall.

He describes the initial days of the attack during which General Montgomery's forces penetrated the German desert defences as quite a brawl.

When Rommel took Horace Greely's advice and headed west, without tarrying, Flt. Sgt. Douglas took part in strafing opera-tions. He says that the aerial cannon on British planes will knock down almost anything on wheels.

Although he has been in Libya and Egypt for some months, Flt. Sgt. Douglas claims to have downed no 'planes but messed up quite a few of them. "So far, all I've got is pieces", he says.

Fighting in aerial combat over the desert has its advantages and disadvantages, he relates. 'Plana maintenance is rendered difficult because sand gets into guns, motors, and other mechanism like sand gets in spinach.

Sun's Glare Hard on Eyes.

The sun's glare is hard on the eyes, says Flt. Sgt. Douglas. "Very few pilots wear goggles or sun glasses because they keep you from keeping your eyes pealed. You have to sacrifice comfort for unhampered visibility", he explains.

The nice part of desert flying is that a pilot can land almost any place if he's in trouble. Many of the 'planes which are forced down come blazing because bullet-proof gasoline tanks are no insurance against explosive aerial cannon shells. But the fellows generally get out.

"Once you get above the sand storms, visibility is marvellous, though", the fighter pilot contin-ued. "You can see for miles and miles at 30,000 feet up. You see

the Suez Canal, Italy, and the

One of the marvels of military organization is British surgery behind the front lines.

"I've seen an Australian pilot with a bullet hole in the back of his head and you could see the hole where the bullet came out over his left eye. In three weeks he was out of the hospital and the only thing which was apparently wrong with him was his memory. He had difficulty recognizing people for a few days. Another chap had an anti-tank shell hit him in the back. In a few weeks he was up and around too. Very few of the wounded die over there."


Flt. Sgt. Douglas has some hospital experience of his own. He was brought down and had an arm burnt with hot glycol which streamed from his engine.

He enlisted in the R.C.A.F. on October 15, 1941, saw training at Camp Borden, St. Eugene, Summerside, P.E.I., and in England. He's a graduate of the Ottawa Technical School, and a member of the Ottawa Ski Club.

Among the Ottawa boys in Africa, he met Flying Office Jowsey, P. O. McIlhenney, an P. O. Bob Hazel who are all d ing very well.

Local groups are making sure Norine Duhn is not forgotten.

Within a week of her premature death at age 32, the popular recreation programmer has two events planned in her honour.

The Almonte Curling Club has named a trophy the Norine Duhn award to give to people who dedicate themselves to the sport. Ed Douglas, a long-time member of the club, accepted the new trophy Friday night.

The curling club executive had already decided to create an award for a person who "best exemplifies the true spirit of curling in Almonte through interest, dedication and effort for the betterment of the game."

The club's past-president June Dalgity named the trophy after Duhn, a close friend, who worked in the arena complex and often curled and helped with club activities.

TYPS (Taking Young People Seriously) plans to have a walk-a-thon in May to raise money for the arena expansion, another of Duhn's pet projects. The event is tentatively titled "Walking for Norine."

It will follow the route Duhn laid out for the annual 10-

kilometre Terry Fox Run.

Duhn's girls basketball team, that placed second in the Eastern Ontario championship the day she died, went on to catch bronze at the provincials this past weekend. The girls named themselves "Norine's Dream Team."

Duhn's family asks any donations in her name go to the arena fund. Donations can be made at the Almonte Gazette office. The town hall will issue receipts.
